Biography

I grew up in Pontresina and have been skiing ever since I was able to walk. It used to be just for fun, but when I discovered biathlon, I became ambitious and started training when I was 12 years old.

Since my sport occupied a lot of my time and school also became more and more difficult, I had to put my hobbies like artistic gymnastics, playing the piano, riding and dancing to one side or even give them up completely.

After finishing school, I concentrated entirely on sport in order to participate in the 2014 Olympics in Sochi, which I successfully achieved. My Olympic diploma, as the first Swiss biathlete, was the result of years of work.

I suffered a setback in 2015. Overtraining forced me to take a break and abandon the 2015/2016 season. It took me two years to fight my way back to the top and achieve two Olympic diplomas in PyeongChang 2018 (single and relay).

I prioritised my sport over everything else and I trained very professionally and seriously to accomplish this. Now I have reached a point where I can build on this to achieve great things. Together with my teammates, I achieved this in the mixed

relay in Pokljuka, Slovenia, achieving the first place on the podium for Switzerland. One year later, in the 19/20 season, I was able to take the podium three times with my sisters Selina and Aita and anchor skier Lena Häcki. We are proud to have written Swiss biathlon history and are working hard to achieve further milestones. In 2021, I achieved my best performances of the year at the World Championships and finished solidly in the top 30 in every competition.

The 22/23 season was one of the most successful for the Swiss team. Almost all athletes achieved one of the best personal rankings in the overall World Cup, which makes me very happy and motivates us for the next two years, because for the first time in Swiss biathlon history a World Cup and a World Championships will take place in Lenzerheide. I finished the 22/23 season in 26th place in the overall World Cup.
